- 7. Tell me what your job was today.
- 8. Where did you play the most on the playground?

#### **Types of Car Seats**

Age Group	Type of Seat	General Guidelines	;
Infants & toddlers	Rear-facing–only Rear-facing convertible	All infants and toddlers should ride in a <b>rear-facing seat</b> until they are at least <b>2 years of age</b> or reach the highest weight or height allowed by their car seat manufacturer.	1
Toddlers & preschoolers	Convertible Forward-facing with harness	Children who have outgrown the rear-facing weight or height limit for their convertible seat should use a <b>forward-facing seat</b> with a harness for as long as possible, up to the highest weight or height allowed by their car safety seat manufacturer.	
School-aged children	Booster seats	All children whose weight or height exceeds the forward-facing limit for their car safety seat should use a <b>belt-positioning booster</b> <b>seat</b> until the vehicle seat belt fits properly, typically when they have reached 4 feet 9 inches in height and are 8 through 12 years of age. All children younger than 13 should ride in the back seat.	
Older children	Seat belts	When children are old enough and large enough for the vehicle seat belt to fit them correctly, they should always use <b>lap and shoulder seat belts</b> for the best protection. All children younger than 13 years should ride in the back seat.	

Parents and Caregivers: The Nebraska Child Safety Restraint Law will change January 1, 2019, look for information in upcoming newsletters. If you have any questions regarding the current law please talk to a staff member at Head Start.



## You can teach your child to walk safely.

Here are some simple steps you can use and practice with your child.



Be seen. Dress in bright clothes. Use reflective material. Carry a flashlight at dawn and dusk.

#### Cross together.

Children need to cross the street with a grown-up.





Get the facts. Know where and when your children are walking. Know who is with them.

#### Watch, then cross.

Stop at the edge. Look left, right and left again. Wait until the road clears. Keep watching as you cross.





### Know where to go. Walk on sidewalks.

If there is no sidewalk, walk on the far left facing traffic.

Cross safely. Use crosswalks. Only cross streets at corners. Never cross from between parked cars.





Stay Together. Young children should always walk with a grown-up. Older children should walk with a buddy.

#### Follow the rules.

Set an example for your children. Obey all traffic signs and signals. Children will copy what you do.



# Your Child is in Safe Hands . . . Yours

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### Usted puede enseñarle a su hijo a caminar de manera segura.

A continuación hay unos simples pasos que puede usar y practicar con su hijo.



Asegúrese de que los vean. Usen ropa de colores

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brillantes. Usen materiales reflectantes. Al amanecer y anochecer lleven una linterna.

# Crucen la calle juntos.

Los niños tienen que cruzar la calle con un adulto.





Manténgase Informado. Sepa dónde y cuándo sus hijos están caminado. Sepa quién o quienes están con ellos.

#### Miren a su alrededor y luego crucen.

Deténganse al borde de la acera. Miren a la izquierda, a la derecha y otra vez a la izquierda. Esperen hasta que la calle esté despejada de tráfico. Continúen mirando mientras cruzan.





Sepa por dónde ir. Caminen en las aceras. Si no hay aceras, caminen a la izquierda de frente al tráfico.

#### Crucen de manera segura.

Usen los cruces peatonales. Solo crucen las calles en las esquinas. Nunca crucen en medio de vehículos estacionados.





No se separen. Los niños pequeños siempre deben caminar con un adulto. Los niños mayores deben caminar con un compañero. Siga las reglas. Sea un ejemplo para sus hijos. Obedezca todas las señales de tránsito. Los niños copiarán lo que usted haga.
